One of Doyle's early short stories, "J. Habakuk Jephson's Statement" (1884), helped to popularise the mystery of the *Mary Celeste*. He used his extensive knowledge of the world to good effect in the short stories collected in this volume. One of the characters in Muddock's detective fiction was the Glaswegian detective, Dick Donovan. This character became so popular and well known that Muddock started publishing stories using Dick Donovan as his pen name. Muddock also wrote true crime stories, horror, and thirty-seven novels, mostly as Dick

Donovan. Despite his prolific output, Muddock had few publications after about 1920 and died in 1934, relying on his daughters to support him at the end of his life. This new edition of *Tales of Terror* from Solis Press features short annotations as footnotes that explain some aspects of the stories that nowadays might be less well understood.
